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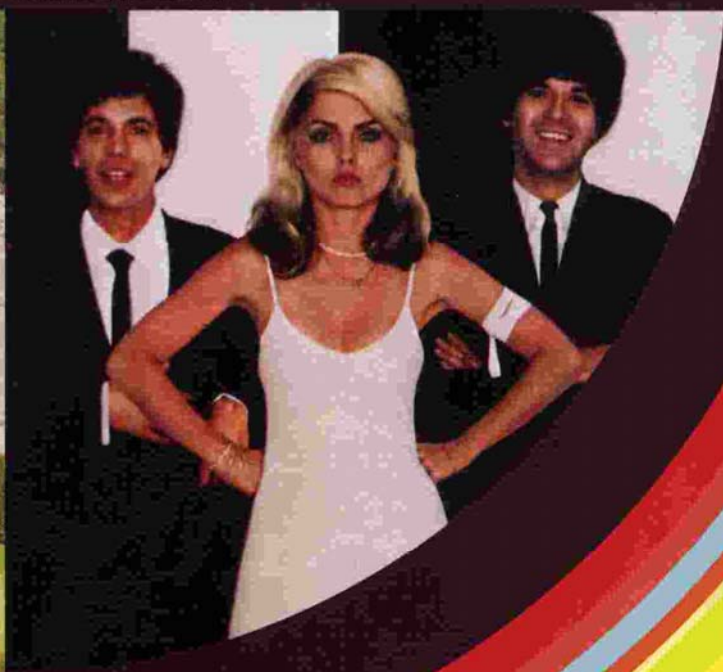
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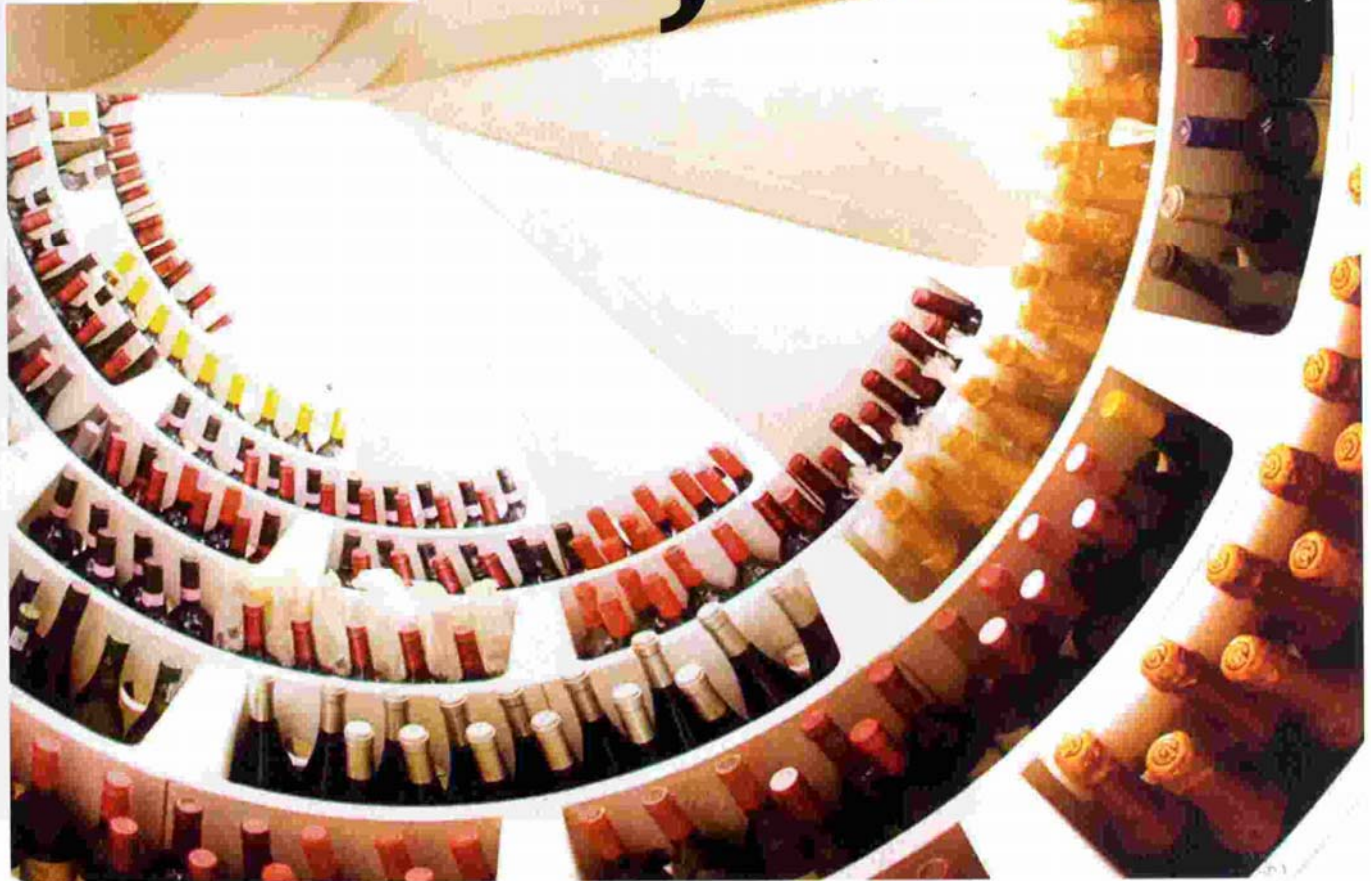

The garage, kitchen or cupboard under the stairs may be a typical temporary resting places, but they're hardly ideal for maintaining quality. Luckily, Spiral Cellars has come up with a unique and simple idea that recreates the conditions of a traditional wine cellar beneath your property, allowing you to keep your wine in the perfect environment.

Inspired by the Pont du Gard – a stunning aqueduct in France with an internal spiral staircase – Frenchman Georges Harnois developed the idea of spiral wine storage in 1978 and the company has since installed over 17,500 cellars across France and the UK.
